1. Convincing Vision and Package

- equity (global and national scale) burden sharing, risk sharing, opportunity sharing




"The Package" (Electricity / Germany)

- e.g. Electricity
 - close to 100 percent renewables in 2050 (SuperSmartGrid)
 - decentralist where possible, large scale where necessary
 - strong increase of energy productivity
 - grid restructuring and extension where necessary;
 - testing CCS focus: industrial gases, bio mass, coal power of the last ten years;

Renewable Energy: Growth in Spite of Economic Crisis – The low carbon race has been started

- 2008 /2009: United States and Europe: more renewable power capacity was added than conventional power capacity (coal, gas, nuclear).
- Renewables accounted for 60 percent of newly installed power capacity in Europe in 2009, and nearly 20 percent of annual power production.
- China added 37 GW of renewable power capacity, nearly half of the additional world capacity (80 GW)




